Confirmation Anyone?

Bishop Smith will visit St Peter's on November 21 for both services. He will celebrate Holy Baptism and Confirmation at the 10:30 service. For the last month or so we have been busy providing two classes to prepare candidates for these rites.

We have had four youth classes and are wrapping up our adult classes. Over the past few years we have offered our adult Newcomer's classes twice a year as a way of incorporating newcomers and preparing adults for eventual Confirmation.

On November 10 there will be a required class for all adults and any youth who need to make up a class. The session will be a part of our Wonderful Wednesday offering. Dinner is served just after 6:00 p.m. and the class will begin at roughly 6:30.

This, again, is a required class that will cover what Confirmation is, its history and importance. Confirmation is an important step in the life of faith and membership in the Episcopal Church. It calls each candidate to make specific commitments which are not to be taken lightly.

If you are considering Confirmation please make plans to be with us on November 10 so that you can make a well informed and faithful decision.

Christian Formation

One of the things life teaches us is that there is a difference between perception and reality. Sometimes how we perceive things is not the way things really are. We make assumptions, operate on ideas formed in the past and, at times, don't consider whether things have changed for the better or the worse. One perception of our life at St Peter's is that we are lacking in the area of Christian Education. The reality, though, is quite different.

In the recent past it has become common in the church to speak of "Christian Formation" rather than "Christian Education" and most particularly rather than the term "Sunday School." This switch takes into consideration several things. First, we are formed in the faith, not educated. The life of faith is not just about knowing facts and understanding ideas. The life of faith is bigger than that and calls us to embrace it with our whole selves, not just our intellect. Second, Sunday School carries the implication that it is simply to be engaged on Sunday. Formation is a day-to-day endeavor... truth be told, it is more like breath-to-breath. Third, there are various activities that form us rather than classes. Participating regularly in Sunday worship is just as formative as a class.

Again, the reality and strength of Christian Formation is far and above the common perception at St Peter's. Most of us don't realize what a good job we're doing in this area. Let me offer a few numbers and then an anecdote:

On any given week we offer as many as nine opportunities to discover and grow in the life of faith. From classes to choirs to children's chapel, there are numerous opportunities to be formed here at St Peter's and more than a few people avail themselves of the chances.

On Wednesday afternoon our St Mark's Children's Choir gathers. It now has ten members. They learn about music, the faith, our history, liturgy and practice the art of worship and prayer through music! Wonderful Wednesday Nights covers topics as diverse as Bible study, church history, personal stories of pilgrimages and offers an opportunity to be nourished by the fellowship of beloved friends in Christ. The evening ends with the simple beauty of Compline. The adult choir then rehearses. They, too, are formed on myriad levels, experiencing Bach's words that "to sing well is to pray twice."

On Sunday morning we have classes for children, adults, newcomers and youth. This fall the youth class has held as many as 13 youths. In our children's class eight to ten children regularly gather to hear stories of the Bible, engage in activities that bring the stories to their level, and even tend to our Garden. The beauty of this class is captured in the anecdote below. Father Martin gathers a group of adults around him and offers his kind and gentle wisdom as the group explores a deeper understanding of who Jesus is as presented in the Gospels.

Beyond these classes, though, there is the act of worship. As we gather for the Holy Eucharist, regularly eight to ten children gather for Children's Chapel. This is an age appropriate worship experience adapted closely from our Prayer Book that offers our children a way to learn our liturgy, and hear the Word of God on a level that speaks directly to them. Also, each week a children's sermon is preached by Father Martin or me. Questions are encouraged by the group so that our children will always know that the life of faith is one of exploration and discovery, and that God is always a gracious surprise.

Also on Sunday morning our acolytes offer us their service while truly being formed in the faith. Ask some of our senior acolytes what they have learned over the years as torch-bearers, crucifers, Gospel-bearers and thurifers and I suspect you will be surprised by the depth of their answers.

The perception of St Peter's is that we need to be stronger in how we teach the faith. The reality is that we are quietly strong in how we are formed in our faith community. During any given week we have over seventy participants in our various Christian Formation activities. Not bad for a church that has an average Sunday attendance of 134.

Sometimes our perception is different from reality. I invite you to take a peek into any of these formative opportunities and discover one of our strengths as well as, perhaps, an opportunity to grow.

An anecdote from Patti Booher:

The children's Sunday morning class has been learning about the life of Moses and the plight of the Israelites as they traveled to the promised land. Each week I tell a little piece of the story and follow up with a craft, a word puzzle and a coloring sheet pertaining to the lesson. On week four we reached the point of the story where the Egyptians suffer through ten plagues because Pharaoh refused to release the Israelites from their slavery. Because the story has so much detail and I wanted to make sure I didn't leave anything out, I decided to read the story from a Bible we have on hand for Sunday School. It is a Bible geared to upper elementary students and has a lot of extra features throughout, including activities and fun facts. It took me about 20 minutes to read the entire story of the plagues, stopping a few times to answer questions. After reading the story, we moved on to the craft for the day. As we cleaned up and were preparing to leave, one of the older students asked if he could have a Bible. I gave one to him and asked the other students if they would like one, too. They all took a Bible home that day. My only request was that they bring their Bibles back each week so we could use them in class. The following Sunday all the students brought back their Bibles and were eager to turn to the page where the story would continue.

Later in the week, I saw a parent of one of the students in the grocery store and I told her how much I enjoyed having her son in class each week. She told me that her son had been reading his Bible every day and she even had to ask him to stop reading it so he could complete the book he was reading for school. We had a good laugh about the absurdity in having to ask a child to stop reading the Bible.

By-laws

Earlier this year the Vestry decided it was time to review our by-laws. After studying the issue of what by-laws are and what they are not, it became apparent that ours needed some attention. Of course, the review of by-laws should be a regular practice of any organization.

Just over a year ago our Diocesan Convention adopted an entirely revised set of Canons. The General Convention, too, had made extensive changes in their Canons over the years. This led us to believe that our by-laws needed careful study. On October 12, 2010, the Vestry passed a revision of our by-laws after many months of work.

The process began with studying an article published by Church Law and Tax Report, a leading periodical of legal issues pertaining to the church. A draft copy of the by-laws was produced, paying close attention to this article and echoing very closely our current by-laws and Diocesan canons.

This first draft was reviewed by a committee of Vestry persons appointed by the Rector with the approval of the Vestry. After some revisions the second draft was submitted to the full Vestry for review. Further revisions followed.

This third draft was then reviewed by the Reverend Becky Robbins-Penniman, priest-in charge at Church of the Good Shepherd, Dunedin; a lawyer and the primary author of the Diocese's canons. She suggested minute and particular changes with helpful explanations.

A fourth draft was then read by the Vestry and mostly grammatical and punctuation errors were corrected. The final draft was submitted to the Vestry for study. In September we took the required first of two votes to amend our bylaws as revised. At the October meeting the final reading and vote passed the bylaws unanimously.

Our bylaws are an important document. They define who we are and how we live together. Because of this they are posted on our website at the following address:

Call me Naaman

Some days ago—never mind how long precisely—having no prior knowledge or obligation to the Vestry, I was invited to see another side of the church by attending a Vestry meeting. Through this experience, I learned two things. Firstly, I have something in common with Naaman. Secondly, there is nothing secret, obscure, or fantastical about the Vestry.

Before the meeting began, we met in the church. Fr. Tom gave a short sermon that was carefully paced and very thought provoking. The sermon focused on the story of Naaman who had leprosy and was told of a prophet named Elisha who could cure this disease. Upon this discovery, Naaman traveled to Samaria to meet Elisha and be healed.

Naaman expected a spectacle of boisterous prayer and flagrant arm waving that would end with his cleansing. But when Naaman was told to simply wash in the river seven times, he was enraged. He later came to his senses, followed the advice of the prophet, and was healed.

I repeat this story to illustrate how much like Naaman I was in my understanding of the Vestry. Before I attended the meeting, I created an image of how it would play out. I could see the meeting being called to order with a gavel which would trigger procedural speech and decorum. Once the introductory measures were addressed, the mood of the room would transcend as the Vestry discussed how to manage church tradition in a rapidly evolving popular culture. Lastly, the meeting would conclude by producing a perfect explanation of the mystery of the Holy Trinity in under 500 words.

My image was romanticized just like Naaman's vision of his curing ceremony. I believed I would witness some ceremony and pomp that I would not understand but would be inspired by all the same. I was wrong about the ceremony and I was wrong about how much I would understand. I was only right about being inspired. Rather than being inspired by pomp, I was inspired by simplicity.

The meeting was straight forward and productive. Motions were made and votes were taken. The budget, attendance, committee reports, and upcoming events were all raised and discussed. The tone of the room was quiet, calm, and casual. All meeting topics were familiar. All matters were presented in terms I understood. The meeting concluded as casually as it had started and the members went on their way.

After the meeting, I had a good laugh at my original image of the Vestry. I now know the Vestry is a group of everyday parishioners who serve the church with their time and faculties. There are no prerequisites, tests, or qualifications other than a shared love for God and our fellow man. Each member shares the common goal of caring for our church while maintaining our own peculiar parish identity.

The actions of the Vestry at a glance may seem like a simple wash and repeat in a river, but we must not make the same mistake as Naaman. The Vestry is not secret, obscure, or fantastical but its simplicity does not reduce its importance. It is our Vestry that ensures the health of our parish, and the impact we have on the community, will endure.

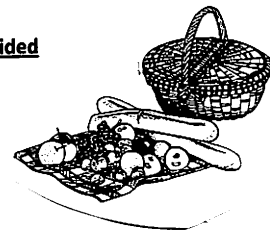

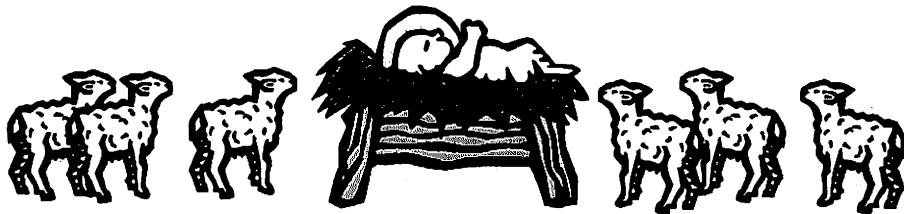

What's Happening in the Garden

Germination has occurred in all thirty containers. Some of the winter crops did not germinate as well as wanted but can be reseeded in November. They were actually planted too early but in our enthusiasm, we just took a risk.

So far pest and disease problems have been minimal but this probably won't last considering our hot, humid climate. The garden is inspected several times a week so problems can be addressed immediately.

During this early growth stage, changes occur almost daily. If you haven't walked through in the past week, take a stroll down the rows as you will notice the different crops are beginning to be recognizable. A suggestion has been made to label the containers with the plants growing in them. This is a good suggestion and we will work on this.

As of this writing, twenty and one half (20 1/2) containers have been sponsored leaving nine and one half (9 1/2) opportunities to sponsor a garden container. The suggested amount is \$30 and the money will be used to pay for equipment we don't currently have as well as future seedlings, seeds etc. If a sponsor wishes to sponsor in memory or honor of a loved one, indicate this at the time the donation is made. Remember, sponsoring a container does not obligate the sponsor to maintain the container or work in the garden.
